



An Egyptian (Gypsy) history

There have been numerous recommendations (National Federation of Gypsy Liaison Groups London Conference Sept 07) that have called for a history book regarding Gypsy people that can be rolled out in schools. DGLG has decided that it will implement this book as part of the Moving Forward book scheme rather than end the scheme all together. There have been approximately 300 Acts and clauses in legislation that has an impact on the lives of our people - over 100 within the Victorian era. Some Acts were designed to have genocidal effect on the Gypsy people of England, other clauses and Acts have had a detrimental effect without the realisation that they would impact. Recent research shows that the first arrival of Gypsy people was not logged in 1505 but some 20 years earlier. We give a snippet of a tiny bit of history here, watch out for the book.

- 1530 The Egyptian Act: People calling themselves Egyptians are to be barred from entering England. They are hereby given 16 days to leave or risk imprisonment and loss of their goods and possessions King Henry V111.
- 1554 Egyptians Act: this Act banned Gypsy people coming to England and imposed the death penalty to those who did not leave England within one month. Queen Mary.
- 1562 An Act for the better Relief of the Poor of this Kingdom, Queen Elizabeth 1. Added that Egyptians be added to Rogues, vagabonds and sturdy beggars within the meaning of this Act.

" And if such person or persons shall refuse to go, or shall not remain in such parish where they ought to be settled as aforesaid, but shall and may be lawful for any Justice of the Peace of the City, County or Town Corporate where the said Offence shall be committed to send such person or persons offending to the House of correction, there to be punished as a Vagabond, or to a public Workhouse in this present Act hereafter mentioned, there to be employed in Work or Labour".....shall think fit to be transported to the England Plantations.

- 1824 Vagrancy Act imprisonment for those wandering telling fortunes living under tent and cart.
- 1835 Highways Act a fine for camping on the highway.
- 1889 Local Government Act councils allowed to make byelaws.

- 1960 Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act.
 3 decades of further Acts
- 1994 Criminal Justice Act.
 and still in 2006/7 Romany Gypsy people have found themselves stripped of their 'gypsy status'.
 The worry is being legislated out of existence within 'mainstream' policy.



The Clearwater Gypsies

The aim of the Clearwater Gypsies is to lead by action. We challenge local authorities to fulfill their legal duty. We discuss Local Development Frameworks to ensure that provision is made for both settled and transit Gypsy Travellers. We set up our own permanent site and the first transit site in the south of England for 25 years. Both sites are recommended in the good practice guide recommended by government. We did this at our own expense to give an example of what good accommodation for Gypsy people should be. We worked with Southampton council and secured their first transit site secured by one vote (changing one councillors view) we try to build links with the settled community by staging events such as the Romani Roots festival, that shows Gypsy way of life and culture. 
Be Aware!!!

Not all solicitors understand Gypsy planning and neither do some planning consultants. Please take good advice or it may cost you more than you bargained for, anything from between £12,000 and £20,000 in fines and a short stay at HM pleasure of 6 days to 3 weeks. We wouldn't want this list getting any longer or worse.

How to apply for planning permission

Gypsy sites need to have planning permission to avoid enforcement action or eviction.

This leaflet explains how to apply for planning permission and contains contact details if you need more information.

Applying for Planning Permission

You need to apply to your local planning authority (usually the District, Borough or City Council) for planning permission.

You will need to send the Council:

- Application forms and certificates
- A plan showing where your site is
- A plan showing the layout and details of your site, such as car parking and hedgerows or fences
- A design and access statement
- A supporting statement

The Design and Access statement should explain what the site will look like, how it fits in with the area and how easy it is to get to local facilities.

Your supporting statement should include why you need the site and relevant information about your situation (for example children attending local schools).

A Planning Officer will deal with your application.

Remember:

- **ALWAYS** get up-to-date advice on planning. Out-of-date information could prove very costly.
- Make sure you know where your site is so you apply to the right planning authority sometimes it isn't obvious!
- Make sure your plans meet caravan site licence requirements (for example spacing of trailers, septic tanks)



- Show that you have thought about the environment:
 - Don't put down more hard standing than you really need, especially in rural areas
 - Always plant native trees that grow locally – don't plant fast growing conifers
 - Ask the Council if they will provide a separate bin for your recycling

The Planning Process

The Planning Officer will:

- Visit your site
- Write to your neighbours
- Investigate issues such as flood risk, noise, pollution and road safety

You can ask people such as your doctor or education support service and local Gypsy/Traveller support group for supportive letters.

Your application will be recommended for approval or refusal. Local councillors will decide whether or not to approve it.

You might be allowed to speak for a few minutes at the meeting.

BE AWARE!!!! You cannot discuss your application with them unless they ask you questions and you may only have 3 minutes to get your main points across.

If refused, you can appeal against the decision. An independent Planning Inspector then decides your application.
